

Turning grey todays into colourful tomorrows

Our Story



In IsiXhosa, the word “Imibala” means “colours”. “Turning Grey Today’s into Colourful Tomorrow’s” is a phrase that The Imibala Trust has embodied to bring colour and meaning into the lives of countless people in the Helderberg and Graaff-Reinet areas.

In 1999, Mrs Gynor Rupert rented a property in Andries Pretorius Street in Somerset West. The aim was to create employment for women by training them to sew, bead, cook etc. Mrs. Rupert then bought a property around the corner in Bright Street, and over the years has added seven more properties which today make up the Imibala Village.

How did this develop? The initial property purchased by Imibala Pty Ltd was to promote the work of the charity. Imibala was registered as a Trust in 2005. One of the trustees, Dr Harold Riley, an artist from Manchester, donated a portrait of the late Nelson Mandela to be auctioned at a gala event in New York. Mr. Johann Rupert was the highest bidder and the price he paid was donated by Dr Riley to Imibala: the start of an endowment fund for the newly established Trust. The Sponsor-A-Child programme with an Art programme (initiated by Gaynor Rupert’s mother, Donna Downie, and run by volunteers) was established.

In time, drama, pottery, ballet, music, mathematics, and life skills programmes were introduced as Imibala grew organically to meet the identified needs of school children of our time. Today, there is an Imibala precinct, which extends over eight properties along Bright Street and Stellendal Road in Somerset West. One belongs to the Imibala Trust while seven others are made available to the Imibala Trust for their commercial and philanthropic purposes. All funds received from sponsors and donors are allocated exclusively to the children.

With the move to Bright Street, the focus shifted from assisting adults to encouraging primary school children in disadvantaged Helderberg communities to go to school. It was established that a basic need for a school uniform could not be provided in many households. This was a concern for school principals as it negatively affected the academic performance, self-esteem, and dignity of the children. The sponsorship of school uniforms was implemented. In 2002, fifty-three children were sponsored in two schools and in 2023, three-thousand children, from thirty-one schools (twenty-one schools in the Helderberg and ten schools in Graaff-Reinet), received school uniforms. Also provided are a number of extramural programmes and a nutritious meal for over eight hundred Imibala children every week. More than eighty-seven-thousand lives have been touched and transformed by these initiatives.

The Rupert family has conveyed their passion for Imibala so effectively that friends, acquaintances, and business associates have contributed to the significant growth of The Imibala Trust over the years. Today, with the support of more than two-thousand donors, sponsors, and volunteers, the Imibala Trust is growing from strength to strength, preparing the youth for a better future.

Imibala is about giving disadvantaged children a happier childhood. Besides the school uniform they receive, they also have access to an array of programmes which include art, pottery, ballet, modern dance, hip hop, coding, literacy, life skills and many others.

This then impacts positively on the lives of the parents and grandparents, often in families with no one employed.

We now have three Imibala's, one in Somerset West, one in Graaff-Reinet and a newly acquired space in Hermanus. In time we hope to open more satellite Imibala's and to fill a need for the many children in our country.

It is heartwarming to welcome back successful adults who were once Imibala children, returning to give back and pay forward the gift of Imibala to the next generation. Imibala’s holistic approach, rooted in kindness, respect, grace, and courtesy, has proven to be extremely effective.

Sponsor-A-Child



The Sponsor-A-Child uniform programme is the predominant method for supporting children. Currently, it impacts the largest number of children who pass through Imibala's doors. The Imibala Trust provides a basic school uniform to vulnerable children from challenged backgrounds, with a current group of three-thousand children from twenty-one schools in the Helderberg and ten schools in Graaff-Reinet.

As part of responsible Corporate Governance, the Trust conducts an annual verification process to determine the status of each child. New children are identified and adopted into the programme as part of the continued effort to support parents facing extreme financial and social constraints.

By sponsoring a child, you are providing a life-changing gift to a child in South Africa, creating a positive overall impact.

Creative & Performing Arts



The Creative and Performing Arts Department encourages more than five hundred children to discover and develop creative skills in a way that is not always possible at school. Imibala facilitators and volunteers nurture the children and help them with life skills wherever possible.

The programmes are informal and aimed at giving children exposure for a period of one year, except for ballet and music, where children develop their skills over a longer period. These activities are carefully coordinated with their school schedules to ensure their academic school day is not disrupted.

This department provides a platform from which to offer programmes that make a substantial difference in the lives of the children currently, and as they prepare for their lives after school.

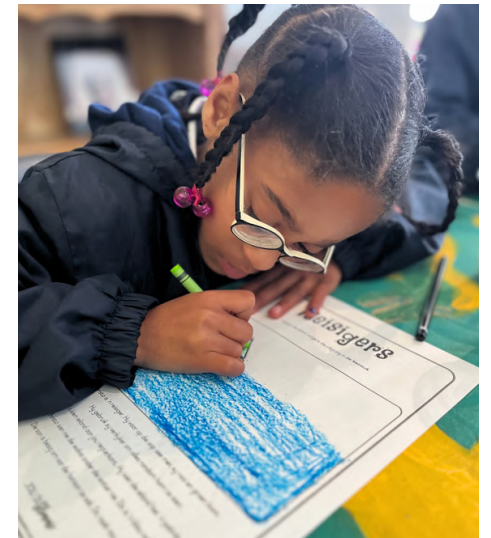

The success of the Learner Advancement Department is achieved through a learner-centred educational approach that focuses on empowering learners to take charge of their personal development.

Integral to the founding vision of the Imibala Trust in Somerset West has been the wish to replicate the model developed there in other parts of the country.

With the opening of the Imibala Gallery in Graaff-Reinet in 2014, the Trust had a launch pad in this beautiful country town. The basic entry programme of Sponsor-A-Child has now been rolled out into ten schools. Through outreach into the community and advertising at the Drostdy Hotel and in the Gallery itself, more than four-hundred children now receive school uniforms.

The Trust encourages any partners to assist in growing Imibala Graaff-Reinet. Imibala's aim is to provide these children with programmes that will be relevant to their development on their individual paths to responsible citizenship.
